WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

For the past number of years Mustard Seed Ireland's 'Children for Children' Volunteer Programme saw more than 200 Irish TY student volunteers fundraise and travel to Mustard Seed Jamaica, to witness first-hand the good work of Mustard Seed.

With the onset of the pandemic all our international programmes have come to a sudden halt, with devastating effects for the charity.

Over the years our youth volunteers have become such an integral part of what we do. We want to continue to work with them to raise awareness and to be the voices for Mustard Seed in Ireland.

'Dare to Care' is an exploration of Global Citizenship. Through a series of workshops we explore Global Citizenship with a focus on Social Justice & Equality, Identity & Diversity and Sustainability.

The programme looks closely at the importance of Sustainable Development and uses the Communities Mustard Seed serves around the world as real-life examples of Sustainable Development and Global Citizenship in action.

Students come to appreciate their position as Global Citizens and learn how to use their voice to create the kind of world they would like to live in.

Option 1: Workshops 1 - 7

WORKSHOP 1 -AN INTRODUCTION

A brief history of Mustard Seed Communities and it's growth. We look at the role that volunteers have played in this work and the contribution that our participants can make through advocacy, fundraising and education.

WORKSHOP 2 - GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

In this workshop we explore Global Citizenship, what it means to us, our rights and responsibilities and how our position as Global Citizens can help in addressing issues of Social Justice, Diversity and Sustainability.

WORKSHOP 3 - SOCIAL JUSTICE & EQUALITY

By examining symptoms and causes of extreme poverty around the world we develop our understanding of the effects of social injustice and inequality on developing countries.

WORKSHOP 4 - Social Justice & Equality (2)

Following on from workshop 3 we look at addressing social injustices and global inequalities through development work. In particular we look at Mustard Seed Zimbabwe it's education, training and sustainable farming projects.

In Workshop 5 we talk about prejudice; what it looks like, where it comes from and the negative and dangerous effects of prejudice. We look at the impact of historical processes on diversity and identity in an Irish and international context, from the Magdalene Laundries to the BLM movement.

WORKSHOP 6 - IDENTITY & DIVERSITY (2)

In this workshop our focus shifts to Mustard Seed Jamaica and the progress it is making in addressing issues of prejudice. We take Mary's Child, a centre for teenage mothers and Matthew 25:40, a home for teenage boys affected by HIV as case studies. We look at the lives of these young people and how the support and empowerment of Mustard Seed's programmes affects their lives.

In this workshop we look at Sustainability from a personal perspective; our choices as consumers, our behaviours, the food we eat etc. We discuss the impacts of today's action on the future but also how climate change is effecting developing countries right now.
